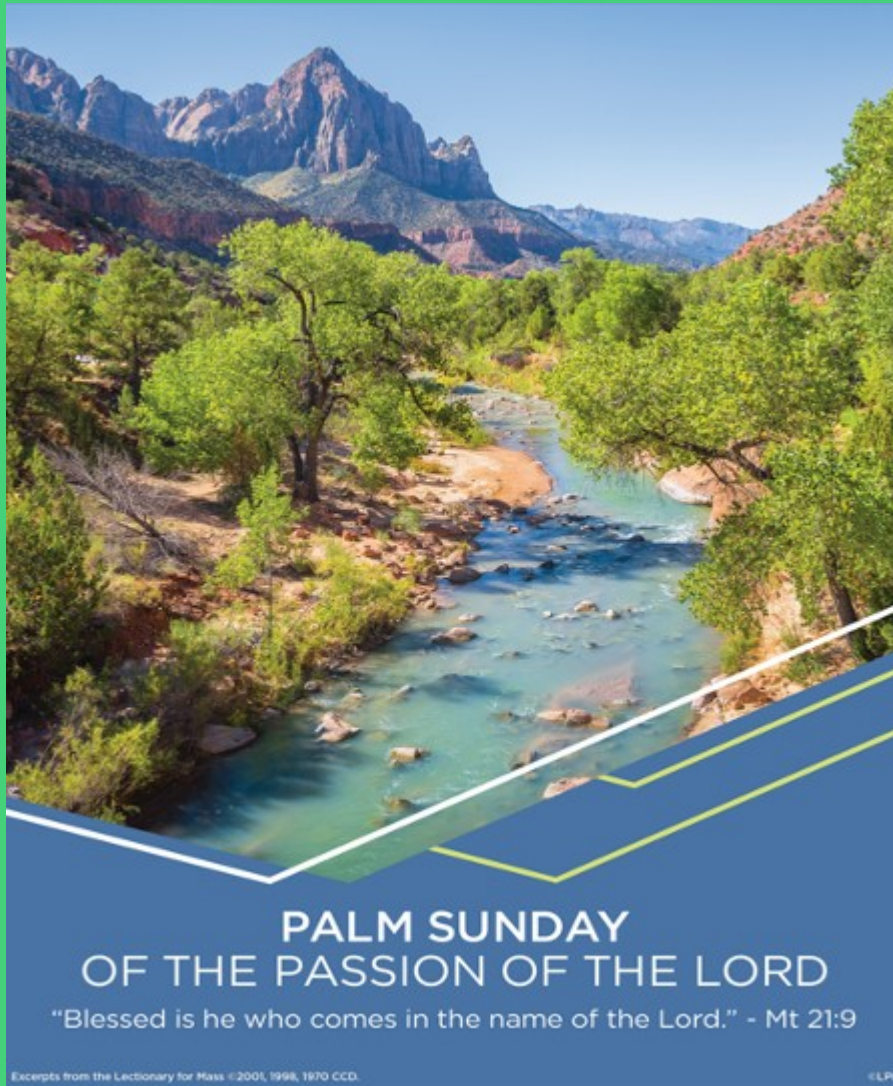

From Father Albert

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

Holy Week, the final week of Lent and the lead-up to Easter Sunday, stands as one of the most sacred periods in the Christian calendar. It commemorates the final days of Jesus Christ’s earthly life, including His suffering, passion, death, and glorious resurrection.

Holy Week is not merely a ritualistic observance, but it is a profound spiritual journey marked by prayer, reflection, sacrifice, and hope.

Palm Sunday marks Jesus’ triumphant entry into Jerusalem, where crowds greeted Him with palm branches—an act of homage that would soon turn into betrayal. The crowd’s joyful cries of “Hosanna!” remind us to welcome Christ into our own hearts with faith and humility.

Maunder Thursday commemorates the Last Supper, where Jesus instituted the Eucharist and Priesthood and washed His disciples’ feet, offering a timeless example of humility and service. Jesus is teaching us to love one another through humble service. “Do this in remembrance of me” is not just a ritual—it’s a way of life.

Good Friday solemnly recalls Christ’s crucifixion and death on the cross, a day of mourning and contemplation of the immense sacrifice made for humanity’s redemption. Fasting and abstinence is reminding us of our spiritual discipline and solidarity with those who suffer.

Holy Saturday is a day of silence and waiting, symbolizing the time Jesus spent in the tomb before rising from the dead. A quiet day of waiting and hope. Though the tomb is sealed, we hold on to the promise of resurrection. It is a time to sit with silence and prepare our hearts.

Easter Sunday bursts forth in joyful celebration of Christ’s resurrection, the cornerstone of our Christian faith, affirming the victory of life over death, and hope over despair. Christ is risen, and with Him, we rise to new life. It is a celebration of victory, renewal, and eternal hope.

Holy Week is not just a commemoration of events—it’s an invitation to transformation. Participating in the liturgies, Stations of the Cross, and other Holy Week services fosters a sense of belonging and shared faith within our faith community. As we journey with Jesus, we are called to renew our faith, strengthen our commitment to love and service, and to rejoice in the hope that Easter brings. Let us enter this sacred time with open hearts and prayerful spirits. May this Holy Week draw us closer to Christ and to one another.

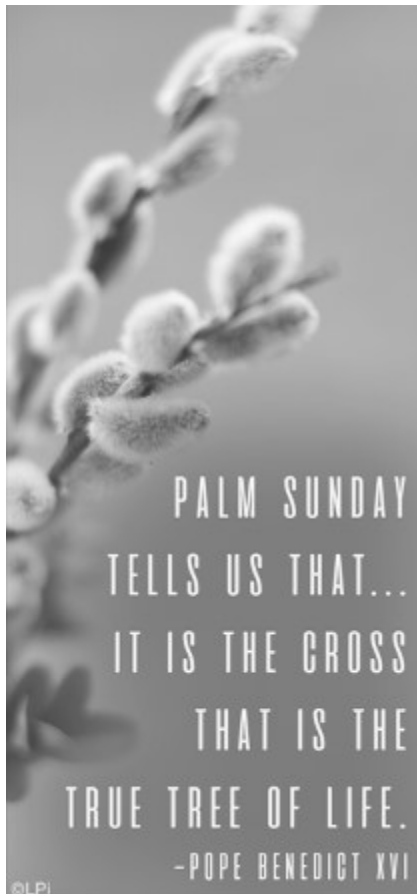

Liturgy & Life

We have all had the experience of going from a high to a low as we experience life. At one moment because something exciting has happened we feel so positive and so alive. A few minutes later because something else has happened we experience a low. Perhaps this high and low is caused by some good news that we have heard, like a relative coming to visit, but then we hear of the car trouble that is quite serious. We move from a high to a low.

When we experience this Sunday's gospels, and yes there are two, we move from a high to a low. Palm Sunday begins with the proclamation of how Jesus enters the city of Jerusalem. He sends two of his disciples to fetch a donkey that is tied there. They bring the colt to Jesus even though those whom they encounter wonder why they are doing so. They indicate that this is what their Master desires. Jesus climbs on the colt and begins his journey to the Mount of Olives. As he travels along, his disciples praise God with joy for the mighty deeds that they have seen Jesus do. It is during this first gospel that those of us, who are at the Liturgy, receive their palms and praise Jesus, for what he has done. When we have experienced this high, we move in the Eucharistic Liturgy with its first reading from Isaiah and then the second reading from Philippians. Immediately the Passion of Jesus Christ, according to Luke, begins and as it does, we are brought low because we know how this turns out.

Since there are many characters in the story from the Gospel of Luke, we can place ourselves in the story quite easily. Are we at the last supper that Jesus shares with his disciples? Are we willing to share this meal with him? Do we even understand what this meal means? The bread and wine that is shared is the body and blood of Jesus Christ. Partaking in it means that we will partake in his life and death as well. At this point we what is coming. It will be the Resurrection on Easter Sunday and eventually our own resurrection at the end of our time on this earth in bodily form which we will experience as well.

Luke portrays Jesus in the garden and we see the very humanness of Jesus. He asks God to remove from him what he is about to suffer. He prays so diligently that even his sweat is like drops of blood. His disciples fall asleep because they cannot endure what is happening. Will we like them, not staying awake and suffering with their master and friend? After this, Judas betrays Jesus and the rest of this passion narrative by Luke tells us what happens to Jesus and how even Peter does not remain faithful. Luke tells us that Jesus suffers cruelty and finally death on the cross. Jesus says at the last, "Father into your hands I commend my spirit." He bows his head and dies.

On this Palm Sunday, let us enter into the highs and lows we hear. Let us join ourselves to Jesus and know that our own suffering and death will result in Resurrection which we will experience in our own lives. Because Jesus was both human and divine, he is able to join us as we experience the highs and lows of our lives.
